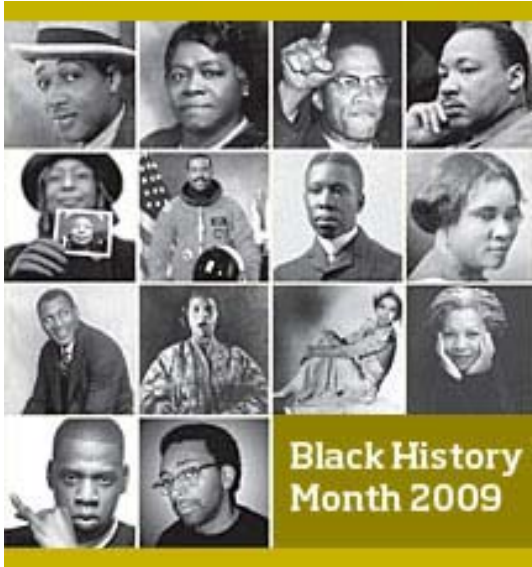

The letter should cite the award for which the student is being nominated, the strengths and leadership qualities of the nominee, and one experience during which he or she exemplified those attributes. If you would like to nominate a student but are unsure for which award he or she is best suited, please submit the letter, and the Student Leadership Award Committee will put it in the appropriate category. Nominations will be accepted via e-mail as well as campus mail.

### **Rhoda M. Dorsey Leadership Award** (Any year)

The Dorsey Award is presented to a student who represents sustained leadership; commitment; teamwork; ingenuity; and ability to work with fellow students, faculty, staff, and administration.

### **Martha A. Nichols Prize** (Any year)

This prize is awarded to a student who, upon the recommendation of the dean of students, is considered to have rendered outstanding service to the college community during the year.

### **Ethelmarie Apter Halpern Memorial Community Service Prize** (Any year)

This prize is awarded to an undergraduate student who has demonstrated, through word and deed, leadership in combating prejudice and fostering good relations between groups and individuals with the college community or community at large.

### **Apter Prize** (Seniors only)

The prize will be given to an outstanding senior who is planning to attend graduate school and who has achieved high academic honors, served the college, and shown outstanding leadership qualities.

### **Elizabeth Nuss Emerging Leader Award** (First-Year Students, Sophomores)

This award is presented to a first- or second-year student who has contributed significantly to the Goucher community through his or her involvement in a campus organization or a

community service program.

**Corene Elaine Amoss Award** (First-Year Students, Sophomores, or Juniors)

Awards will be granted to one or more students who have established an outstanding academic record and participated in more than one aspect of extracurricular life. Candidates must have completed their first year and achieved academic standing as a sophomore. In addition, award recipients must have, and maintain, a minimum grade point average of 3.0.

**Senior Leadership Awards** (Seniors only)

A group of seniors will be recognized for their continuous service and leadership during their time at Goucher.

## **The Department of Physics and Astronomy gives back**

The Department of Physics and Astronomy has replaced four portable 8-inch telescopes in the Lewis Observatory with a new array of computer-controlled, 6-inch telescopes.

The department donated two of its old telescopes to each of the science departments at two

local high schools: Western High School and Baltimore Polytechnic High School.



Assistant Professor Ben Sugerman will take members of Goucher's Physics and Astronomy Club to the high schools in March to train some of the high school students on how to use the telescopes. ## Kudos

Physics students **Sean Lonsdale '10** and **Adrien Thormann '10** presented the results of their summer research project in January at the 213th Meeting of the American Astronomical Society Long Beach, CA. The students worked with Assistant Professor **Ben Sugerman** studying the light echoes from recent supernovae using Hubble Space Telescope data. Lonsdale studied light echoes from SN 1998bu, mapping out dust in the disk of its host galaxy, as well as in an hourglass-shaped nebula immediately surrounding the star. Thormann studied echoes from SN 1991T, some of the first ever seen from a Type Ia supernova. He found that the echoes trace out circumstellar material, which could either be in an ellipsoidal or hourglass-shaped shell. The project was supported by a Hubble Space Telescope grant.

The St. Louis Regional Arts Commission announced plans to develop a five-year strategic plan to make St. Louis one of the leading cities for the arts. The commission partially attributes the move to **Ramona Baker**, Goucher's director of the Master of Arts in Arts Administration Program, who it hired as a consultant.

The Children's Bookstore in Baltimore held a book signing for Goucher English Professor **Elizabeth Spires'** new book of poetry on February 5. Released this month, "I Heard God Talking to Me: William Edmonson and His Stone Carvings" is a collection of 23 free-verse poems and photographs, including images by famed photographers Louise Dahl-Wolfe and Edward Weston, that paints a portrait of Edmondson and his art.
