Mock Classes

Experience one of three classes that are critical to the Goucher Commons Curriculum, including Complex Problem Exploration and First-Year Seminar courses.

- Market Madness, with Dr. Gina Shamshak, professor of economics Location: Julia Rogers G50 We will learn about key economic concepts while taking part in an in-class market activity. Will individuals pursuing their own self-interests lead to market madness or market maximization? Will we see the invisible hand in action? Join us to find out!
- How Do Machines Make Predictions? with Dr. Tom Kelliher, associate professor of data science Location: Julia Rogers G52

Amazon, Netflix, and Spotify, among many other companies, use machine learning to make predictions. To introduce you to computational thinking and "Big Data," we'll explore one of the techniques used for making predictions in machine learning.

How Algorithms Affect Society, with Daniel Swann, assistant professor of sociology and anthropology Location: Van Meter G11

In this class we will explore the ways in which algorithms affect society. Using social media as a frame, we explore some of the large-scale effects that algorithms can have on social institutions and politics. We will also explore intersections with aspects of society like race, class, gender, and sexuality.

The Coach Caslin Classic is held in honor of longtime Goucher track and field and cross country coach John Caslin, who retired following the 2019 season. Caslin came to Goucher as the head cross country coach in 1994 (the fourth season of the program), and later started the track and field program that began competition in 2000-01. He was a three-time conference Coach of the Year and coached over 100 All-Conference selections. John R. Caslin Course is a 2K loop. This year our incoming first-year students read the book My Time Among the Whites: Notes from an Unfinished Education, by Jennine Capó Crucet. The book is available as an e-book through the Goucher Library. This collection of personal essays examines the "theoretical American Dream" from the author's perspective as a daughter of Cuban refugees and a first-generation college student. Every year, the summer read is the first step in new students' exploration of Race, Power, and Perspective-a central component of the Goucher Commons curriculum, and an expression of Goucher's social justice commitments. You are invited to read the book and participate in a discussion facilitated by Juliette Wells, professor of literary studies.

Goucher is pleased to present *In the Dark: An Exploration of Chronic Illness*, an exhibition of new handmade cyanotype photographs by Baltimore-based artist duo DanaidX.

DanaidX, whose name culls from a Greek myth about women cursed by the gods to endlessly fill a cistern riddled with holes, is the collaborative formed by writer/data engineer-cum photographer Hope Brooks and artist Angela Yarian.

With a wide range of archetypal visual references from art history to punk-rock to science-fiction, Brooks and Yarian's images of the female body in everyday domestic life explore the space between creativity and pain in quotidian experience. In so doing, the works invite viewers to question their own understanding of such concepts as rest, wellness, work/life balance, vulnerability, and the passage of time. 
