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Goucher College Poll results: Majority of Marylanders view the Affordable Care Act favorably and support Medicare-for-all; More than half of residents unsatisfied with state of American democracy; President Trump unpopular among Marylanders

BALTIMORE (September 24, 2019)—The Goucher College Poll asked Maryland residents about their views toward President Donald Trump's job performance; former President Barack Obama; the Democratic and Republican Parties; the Affordable Care Act; capitalism and socialism; climate change; and Medicare-for-all. The Goucher College Poll also asked residents about America's openness to people from all over the world and their satisfaction with American democracy. The Goucher College Poll surveyed 763 Maryland adults from September 13-18 and has a margin of error of +/-3.6 percent.

President Donald Trump and the 2020 general election in Maryland

Twenty-seven percent of Marylanders approve of the job Trump is doing as president of the United States; **67 percent** disapprove.

Maryland registered voters who indicated they were paying attention to the campaign for president were asked whether they plan to vote if the presidential election were held today.

- **28 percent** say they will definitely or probably vote for the Republican candidate, Trump.
- **65 percent** say they will definitely or probably vote for the Democratic candidate.

Former President Barack Obama and other key political items

Obama remains a popular political figure in Maryland; **73 percent** view him favorably and **22 percent** view him unfavorably. **Eighty-nine percent** of Maryland Democrats hold a favorable opinion of Obama. Obama earned a **66 percent** approval rating from Marylanders on the September 2016 Goucher College Poll.

Sixty-three percent hold a favorable view of the Affordable Care Act, commonly known as Obamacare; **29 percent** hold an unfavorable view.

Marylanders were more divided in their views toward the two major political parties and different economic systems:

- **47 percent** held a favorable view toward the Democratic Party; **39 percent** held an unfavorable view.
- **33 percent** held a favorable view toward the Republican Party; **56 percent** held an unfavorable view.
- **31 percent** held a favorable view toward socialism; **47 percent** held an unfavorable view.
- **53 percent** held a favorable view toward capitalism; **31 percent** held an unfavorable view.

Climate change and personal impact on the environment

Sixty-nine percent of Marylanders believe climate change is caused mostly by human activity, while **23 percent** think it is caused mostly by natural patterns in the earth's environment. These attitudes fell starkly along partisan lines; **76 percent** of Democrats believe that climate change is caused mostly by human activity, compared to **44 percent** of Republicans. Just **one percent** of Marylanders do not believe climate change exists.

There is widespread agreement concerning the impact that individual lifestyle choices—like recycling or reducing household energy consumption—can have on the overall environment.

Ninety-two percent agree that their choices make a difference; 6 percent disagree that they do.

Views toward Medicare-for-all

Respondents were randomly selected to receive one of two questions about Medicare-for-all.

- **59 percent** support a "Medicare for all" health care system, where all Americans would get their health insurance from the government; **33 percent** oppose.
- **52 percent** support a "Medicare for all" health care system, where all Americans would get their health insurance from the government, <u>replacing private insurance plans</u>; **40 percent** oppose.

Views toward American society and democracy

Respondents were asked to consider the impact of America's openness to people from all over the world.

- 71 percent think openness is essential to who we are as a nation.
- 24 percent think if we are too open we risk losing our identity as a nation.

Compared to data collected by Pew Research Center in July 2019, Marylanders are more likely than all Americans (**62 percent**) to say that openness to people from all over the world is essential to who we are as a nation.

The majority of Marylanders (**56 percent**) are unsatisfied with the current state of American democracy; **36 percent** are satisfied. Democrats (**64 percent**) express more dissatisfaction than their Republican counterparts (**37 percent**).

Survey Methodology

To ensure all Maryland residents are represented, the poll is conducted using random digit dialing (RDD) of a county-level stratified random sample using landline and cellular telephone numbers. The sample of telephone numbers for the survey is purchased from Dynata (https://www.dynata.com/).

The survey was conducted **Friday**, **September 13**, **to Wednesday**, **September 18**. During this time, interviews were conducted 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. on Monday to Friday and noon to 9 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday. The Goucher College Poll uses Voxco Computer-Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI) software to administer its surveys. Interviews are conducted by a staff of professionally trained, paid, student interviewers.

Interviewers attempted to reach respondents with working phone numbers a maximum of five times. Only Maryland adults—residents aged 18 years or older—were eligible to participate. Interviews were not conducted with adults who were reached at business or work numbers. **Eighty percent** of the interviews were conducted on a cell phone and **20 percent** were conducted on a landline.

Interviews for this survey were completed with **763** Maryland adults. For a sample size of **763**, there is a **95 percent** probability the survey results have a plus or minus **3.6 percentage** point sampling error from the actual population distribution for any given survey question. Margins of error are higher for subsamples.

In addition to sampling error, all surveys are subject to sources of non-sampling error, including question wording effects, question order effects, and non-response bias. Margin of error is not adjusted for design effects. Data is weighted by gender, age, race, region, and educational attainment of the state to represent adult population targets established by the most recent American Community Survey (ACS).

Survey Question Design

The Goucher College Poll provides the questions as worded and the order in which they are administered to respondents.

BRACKETED ITEMS []: Items and statements in brackets are rotated to ensure respondents do not receive a set order of response options, which maintains question construction integrity by avoiding respondent agreement based on question composition.

Example: [agree or disagree] or [disagree or agree]

PROBE (p): Some questions contain a "probe" maneuver to determine a respondent's intensity of opinion/perspective. Probe techniques used in this questionnaire mainly consist of asking respondents if their responses are more intense than initially provided.

<u>Example</u>: Do you have a [favorable or unfavorable] opinion of President Obama? **PROBE**: Would you say very favorable/unfavorable?

OPEN-ENDED: No response options are provided for an open-ended question, i.e., it is entirely up to the respondent to provide the response information. Any response options provided to the interviewer are not read to the respondent; they are only used to help reduce interviewer error and time in coding the response.

VOLUNTEER (v): Volunteer responses means the interviewer did not offer that response option in the question as read to the interviewer. Interviewers are instructed not to offer "don't know" or "refused" or "some other opinion" to the respondent, but the respondent is free to volunteer that information for the interviewer to record.
