Resident Teacher Certificate (RTC) for Potential Secondary Foreign Language Teachers in a Maryland Approved Alterative Preparation Program

The RTC Program is designed to attract college graduates who are career changers and interested in teaching. This two-year program will provide the opportunity for teacher candidates to obtain secondary certification.

Benefits for Teachers in this Program

- Immediate fall employment for those who successfully complete summer 2012 requirements.
- Thirty-four graduate credits toward a Master of Arts in Teaching program at Goucher College. The first summer course work is free except for textbooks. During the remaining semesters, each 3 credit course (not seminars) will cost the student \$150 with the school system paying tuition reimbursement for the tuition balance to the College. Seminars are required at no additional cost.
- Coaching and supervision throughout the program.
- RTC certification leading toward Standard Professional Certificate and the "highly qualified" denotation.

Year 1, Fall

- b. ED 687, Internship with Seminar on Instructional Planning and Classroom Management (19.5 clock hours and 1 graduate credit). This seminar, conducted by the coaches, will be held every week. Direct instruction, small group activities and coaching will occur.

Candidate Selection Criteria

The following criteria were determined to be appropriate for the selection of candidates.

- ➤ Bachelor's degree from an accredited IHE in a world language.
- ➤ 2.75 Grade Point Average

- ➤ Qualifying scores on PRAXIS I (10710, 20720, 10730) and PRAXIS II, Content Area before beginning the program. In place of Praxis I, MD will accept the following options from candidates:
 - SAT taken after 2005, math and critical reading composite score of 1100;
 - SAT taken between 4/95 and 2005, math and verbal composite score of 1100;
 - SAT taken prior to 4/95, math and verbal composite score of 1000:
 - ACT composite score of 24;
 - GRE math and verbal composite score of 1000.
- Extensive interview and screening process to include
 - Writing sample
 - Resume
 - Previous experience with children
 - Professional letters of recommendation
 - Interview and application
- Any other requirements of jurisdiction of employment

Completion Requirements

- ➤ All courses, seminars, and program standards reviews each year.
- ➤ Successful completion of performance assessments based on the Maryland State Department of Education Essential Dimensions of Teaching, Standards for Foreign Language Learning and the Interstate New Teacher Assessment and Support Consortium.
- ➤ An evaluation by an educational director indicating at least two years of successful teaching using the Local School System and Goucher College evaluation procedures.
- ➤ Qualifying scores on the Praxis II content pedagogy. (Praxis 1 and II content completed prior to residency.)
- ➤ Upon completion of RTC requirements, local education agencies can request a Standard Professional Certificate (SPC) from the Division of Certification and Accreditation at the Maryland State Department of Education.
