My Time Among the Whites: Notes from an Unfinished Education Jennine Capó Crucet

The **First Year Summer Read** is your first step in what will be a three-year exploration of Race, Power, and Perspective–a central component of the Goucher Commons Curriculum and an expression of the social justice commitments of Goucher College. As a member of the Goucher Community, you will have many opportunities to discuss and explore your own identity; to examine the ways in which race, ethnicity, gender, religion, class, and many other markers of identity affect levels of privilege and access to power; and to develop skills in communicating across difference in the classroom and beyond.

The Race, Power, Perspective (RPP) Roadmap

Your RPP experience begins even before you step foot on Goucher's Campus as you complete the **First Year Summer Read** and write a reflection focusing on both your own and the author's perspectives. Then during your first few days on campus, as part of your orientation, a professor or staff will lead you through your first college discussion about the book and your written reflection.

During your second year of college, you will explore these topics in more depth as you take a specifically designed **RPP course** that will focus on race, power, and perspective taking as it relates to your chosen subject matter.

Finally, as part of your **Study Abroad** experience (typically during your third year) you will be asked to look back on the previous two

years—including by re-reading this first written reflection—and consider how your own perspective has changed and grown since you first became a Goucher student.

The **First Year Summer Read** has three parts.

- **Reading and Prewriting:** Read the book, take notes, and think about the prompts below. You'll do this to prepare for a writing assignment that you'll complete in part 2.
- Written Response: Craft an essay as directed by the prompts below and bring it to the discussion in part 3.
- **Book Discussion:** You will discuss the book with your peers during Fall Orientation, where you will share some of the ideas you considered in Part I & II. (More information about the book discussion will be given prior to First Year Orientation).

Part I: Prewriting: As you are reading the book, take detailed notes on the text. As you are reading, identify:

- The author's biographical information and significant life events.
- Larger cultural and/or historical moments referenced by the author.
- Quotes or passages (mark the page numbers) you would like to discuss with others.

Part II: Written Response: Now that you've had a chance to take notes about the text craft a response essay in which you consider the following three questions:

- How has the author's identity shaped their perspective of the experiences described?
- How might your identities inform these experiences if you were in a similar situation?
- How might your views be similar to and/or different from the author's and why?

Use evidence from at least three specific essays/chapters in the text, one from each section of the book (Early Encounters, Various Immersions, and Resistance in Action).

When crafting your response, consider factors (such as parents, community, personal situation, identity, cultural or religious background, education, etc.) that may have influenced the author's and your own point of view or perspective.

Part III: **Discussion**: On Tuesday, August 22, from 1:30-3:00 pm, you'll participate in a discussion led by Goucher faculty and staff. The students in that discussion group will be your Fall Orientation group (and then turn into your FYE class)! Please bring your prewriting notes, written response, and ideas to the Orientation Discussion.

During your First Year Seminar course (FYS), you will upload your essay to Canvas. You will learn more about how to access and use Canvas during orientation.

Response Essays should be 300+ words or 1 ½- 3 pages double-spaced and should be submitted in a Microsoft Word (.doc or .docx) document.

Lastly, the author, Jennine Capó Crucet, will visit campus to share with you about the book on Monday, September 18 at 7 pm in the Hyman Forum, located in the Ungar Athenaeum ("the Ath"). You are asked to attend this session, likely with the rest of your FYE class.
