POST OFFICE

The Goucher College Post Office is a contract substation of the United States Postal Service (USPS). It is not a full-service U.S. Post Office. First class, Priority, Express, registered, insured, and certified mail can be sent from the campus Post Office to any United States address, including U.S. territories. Additional services include return receipts, packing materials, MTA monthly transit pass, and stamps. The Post Office, located in the Facilities Management Building, is open year-round except for campus-wide closures.

Counter Service hours are from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday. The Post Office, located in the Facilities Management Building, is open year-round except for campus-wide closures. Outgoing mail is picked up by the USPS at 9:30 a.m., Monday through Friday. The USPS blue mailbox located outside of the Facilities loading dock is picked up at 9:30 a.m., Monday through Saturday.

Methods of payment for postal products and services are cash or OneCard. **Credit cards, debit cards, or checks are not accepted**.

OFFICE OF RESIDENTIAL LIFE

RESIDENT ASSISTANTS

RAs are instrumental in helping create a residential experience that is consistent with Goucher's mission and liberal arts approach. FIRST-YEAR VILLAGE

The First-Year village consists of Pagliaro-Selz (P-Selz), Fireside, and Trustee halls and is designed for first-year students to live, work, and socialize together. Take advantage of the communal study areas, central location to Mary Fisher Dining Hall and SRC, common rooms, and full kitchen on each floor! By doing this, students learn to self-advocate, value the differences that make individuals unique, and navigate conflict in a productive and healthy manner. All first-year students complete a roommate agreement during the first weeks of the semester, which allows for roommate pairings to begin to develop both a healthy relationship and a positive dialogue by setting some ground rules for living with one another and day-to-day interactions. This includes addressing everything from personal belongings, cleaning the room, and having visitors to more difficult situations that might arise in a new shared home. COMMUTING TO CAMPUS

COMMUTING TO CAMPUS

Although primarily a residential college, Goucher still welcomes about 14% of the campus population in commuting students. Some information for commuting students to know includes parking, meal options, how to find and use the commuter lounge, and commuter advocacy resources.

PARKING

Student vehicles must be registered by the end of the second week of classes. There is a fee of \$75 per for student vehicle registration, or \$50 for one semester only. Any vehicle purchased during the year must be registered on the first day that it is driven on campus. Students who have already registered a vehicle for the current semester may obtain a new registration decal for a \$10 fee if the decal from their original vehicle is returned.

MEAL OPTIONS

Commuters are invited to eat in the

Mary Fisher Dining Hall, the Student
Market, or at Alice's Café in the Ungar
Athenaeum. A flexible combination of
meals and dining dollars is available
for commuting students and students who live off
campus. Blocks can be used for an all-you-care-to-eat
meal in the Mary Fisher Dining Center or to purchase
a value meal at Alice's Restaurant. Students can also
use money and purchase items in the Student Market,
located in the first level of Mary Fisher Hall.

THE COMMUTER LOUNGE

The Commuter Lounge is located in the lower level of the Ungar Athenaeum, adjacent to the the Hyman Forum (and near Alice's Café.) To access, a student should contact the Office of Student Engagement (ose@goucher.edu) so access is added to their OneCard. Use the OneCard to swipe in during the hours the Athenaeum is open throughout the week. Soft seating, study space, a small kitchenette, and a full refrigerator is available for student use.

LOCKERS

The lockers are available on the lower level of the Ungar Athenaeum as well, outside of the Center for Race, Equity, and Inclusion (CREI). To reserve a locker, please email ose@goucher.edu. Students receive a lock for their locker to use (please DO NOT use any other lock, it will be cut off) throughout the duration of the year.

COMMUTER ADVOCACY RESOURCES

The commuter students at Goucher are supported by the assistant director of the Office of Student Engagement, or OSE. The Office of Student Engagement is located inside Mary Fisher Hall, adjacent to the Student Market (on one's left upon entering). OSE facilitates Commuter Association meetings each month, along with monthly lunches in the dining hall (free to students) and regularly scheduled programming designed for commuters. 
The Office of Campus Safety exists to support the educational mission of Goucher College. The staff members are committed to providing high quality, community-oriented campus safety services that facilitate the provision of educational services to the students of the college. The office strives to protect the rights and safety of all members of the campus community and uses problem-solving strategies to address the security concerns of students, employees, and guests.

Blue Light Emergency Phones: There are 16 blue light phones as well as emergency phones located in campus elevators. The phones are set up to communicate directly to the Office of Campus Safety. If you observe a potential safety hazard, require assistance, notice suspicious activity, feel unsafe, or need a walking escort, you can reach the Office of Campus Safety directly through any blue light phone on campus. Just press the button, and you will be instantly connected to the Office of

Campus Safety.

Contacting Campus Safety: On duty 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and 365 days a year, the Office of Campus Safety is located on the ground floor of Heubeck Hall and can be reached by dialing 410-337-6111.

e2Campus Emergency Notification **System**: The e2Campus notification system will only send information about emergencies and campus closings as text messages* to your mobile phone. To receive these messages, you must be registered in the e2Campus system.



Vehicle Registration Policy: Goucher College grants the privilege to drive on campus to students, faculty, and staff. The privilege assumes that community members will abide by Maryland state



transportation laws. All motor vehicles operated on campus must be registered with the Office of Campus Safety. Registered vehicles must display a current sticker inside the driver's side rear window. Motorcycles must display a current sticker on the rear fender. Vehicle registration permits parking on campus and entry to campus during hours of gate operation and enables campus safety officers to contact owners in the event of problems. Failure to register the vehicle will result in a citation or the banning of the vehicle. You can register your vehicle through myGoucher.



LIVING ON CAMPUS

MEAL PLAN

MEAL "BLOCKS" OR "SWIPES" Refers to one meal. (For example, a 19-meal per-week plan gives a student 19 meals Monday-Sunday, expiring on Sunday. They will not carry forward.)

DINING DOLLARS

Refers to the additional dollars added to a meal plan in 10, 14, or 19 residential meal plan. Dining dollars expire at the close of each semester.

GOPHER BUCKS

Refers to the money added on a OneCard. Gopher Bucks are good in place of cash, debit, or credit cards in most places on campus; they can be used to purchase meals at each campus meal location. Gopher Bucks carry over from semester to semester. A balance larger than \$10 upon graduation will be refunded to students. Gopher Bucks can be used in the College Store, dining hall, Alice's Cafe, Post Office, for laundry, and on vending machines.

CAMPUS HANDBOOK & STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT

ONECARD

The OneCard system makes getting around campus as quick and easy as possible. Every student receives a OneCard, which serves as a college identification, dining, and library card for all four years. It's also each student's key to their residence hall, the Sports and Recreation Center, and other campus facilities.

ADVANTAGES OF THE ONECARD

- **Safety**—Because money is deposited directly in your account, there's no need to carry large amounts of cash on campus.
- **Simplicity**—Use your OneCard as you would a debit card to make purchases easily and efficiently.
- Security—Your OneCard includes your picture to prevent unauthorized use of the card.
- **Savings**—The OneCard is free, and there are no fees for use of the card or for any type of transaction.

GOPHER BUCKS

Money deposited in this account can be used to buy textbooks at the Goucher Bookstore, stamps at the Post Office, or even medicine at the Health Center. Gopher Bucks are accepted at campus vending facilities, copiers, and dining venues on campus.

REPLACING YOUR ONECARD

If you lose your OneCard or if it is stolen, you must report the loss to the Office of Campus Safety. Campus Safety will immediately deactivate the card for the safety and security of the Goucher community as well as to protect the cardholder from monetary loss. Replacement OneCards are issued by Campus Safety for a non-refundable fee of \$10. If the old OneCard is found later, individuals may not request a refund as the old card will no longer be active in our system.

IMPORTANT REMINDERS

- Do not give your OneCard to anyone!
- Do not holepunch your OneCard as this can make the card defective.

Decker Sports and Recreation Center (SRC) was originally built in 1991 as an addition to Lillian Welsh Hall. The Decker Sports and Recreation Center houses the Athletic Program offices, two gymnasiums, a cardio fitness center, a weight room, the Von Borries Aquatic Center, the Todd Dance Studio, a racquetball court, a squash court, athletic training facilities, and varsity locker rooms. The SRC is open to all students, staff, and faculty members. The guest fee for the SRC is \$10 per person, per visit.

Beldon Field is a 105,000-square-foot infill synthetic turf field. Five teams play and practice on Beldon Field: men's and women's soccer, men's and women's lacrosse, and field hockey. Club sport and intramural programming also are able to use the facility for access to a field after dark with lights.

The Evelyn Dyke Schroedl '62 Tennis Center features 12 outdoor courts, provides state-of-the-art facilities, and honors the legacy and generosity of its namesake. Home to the men's and women's tennis teams, it is open to students, faculty, staff, and guests.

Riding Arena and Stables features two full-care barns, 10 turnout paddocks, indoor and outdoor riding rings, multiple rolling riding fields, and acres of trails. It also consists of 13 box stalls, a tack room, and an equipment room.

Eline von Borries Aquatic Center is home to the men's and women's swim team and is open to all students, staff, and faculty members. Students, faculty, and staff are permitted two guests per ID card or pool pass. The sponsor must accompany the guest at all times. The guest fee is \$10 per person, per visit, or a pool pass may be purchased.

GoucherMOVES is fitness for all gophers. We aim to create affirming, inclusive, and empowering spaces through movement and community. Classes are free and no registration is required. No prior movement experience is needed! Come as you are, enjoy the movement communities, and have fun! Canvas (canvas.goucher.edu), a learning management system (LMS), is an online learning environment for web-enhanced, web-supported, and online courses. Students have access to the syllabus, course materials, and other class information.



Email is an official means of communication for Goucher College. Every student is provided an email account to enhance the college's communication capabilities. In recognition that certain communications may be time-critical, the campus community is expected to check their official email address on a frequent and consistent basis in order to stay current with college and course communications.

Navigate student is a mobile app that connects students to a variety of resources, their faculty, and other campus administrators; keeps track of important deadlines; keeps track of classes and progress toward a degree; and much more! Log in to check it out!



ACADEMIC TERMS

Academic Forgiveness Policy: Students may request to eliminate from their GPA calculation up to three courses in which an F grade was earned during their first or second semester at Goucher College. To facilitate the recalculation, the F grade will be converted to a No-Pass (NP) grade.

Academic Leave of Absence: Students in good academic and financial standing may request a leave of absence for either one or two semesters. A leave generally begins at the end of a regular semester, and students are expected to return to the college at the conclusion of their leave.

Academic Progress Report (APR): Academic Progress Report is an online application that instructors can use to identify students who are in academic difficulty, in order to make timely recommendations for corrective action.

Add/Drop: Students may add or drop any full semester course using the online registration system ("myGoucher") during the open add/drop period, which ends on the fifth business day of the semester.

Advising: Advising is a relationship between the student and the faculty member or success advisor that provides students with valuable campus information, an understanding of policies and procedures affecting their academic experience, and the chance to work together as a team to plan successfully for a student's educational goals.

Audit: A full-time student may audit one or more courses per semester without an additional charge.

College Catalog: Students are subject to general degree requirements found in the catalog for the year in which they enter the college, and the major/minor requirements found in the catalog for the year in which they declare their major/minor.

Course Code: The abbreviation and number designated to each course.

Course Load: A full-time student may take between 12.0 and 18.0 credit hours in any semester; however, students should average 15.0 credits per semester in order to reach the 120.0 credits required for graduation within eight semesters.

Credit Hour: A standardized and time-based measure of student progress toward a college degree. In other words, a certain number of hours equals a unit, those units equal a credit, and 120 of earned credits produce a credential or degree.

Dean's List: At the end of the semester, students who display exceptional academic achievement will be recognized through the Dean's List. A minimum grade point average of 3.50 is needed for first-year students to earn Dean's List.

Degree Works: A web-based tool to help students and advisors monitor progress toward degree completion.

Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA):

Designed to protect the confidentiality of education records and give students access to their records to assure the accuracy of their contents. The act affords students certain rights with respect to their education records.





Final Experiences/Examinations: Final experiences/examinations are given at the end of each semester.

First-Year Experience (FYE): A required course for all new students, the FYE continues the orientation process and connects the learning that occurs for students both inside and outside of the classroom.

First-Year Seminar (FYS): First-year seminars are based on faculty-chosen topics, designed to show students what faculty are thinking about and, more importantly, how faculty are thinking about a specific topic.

Goucher Commons Requirements (GCRs): These are course requirements that every Goucher student must fulfill regardless of their major.

Grade Point Average (GPA) Standards: The table below sets the minimum GPA standards set by the Academic Policies Committee. Credits attempted include all transfer credits accepted by Goucher. GPAs listed in the table are based on Goucher work only.

^{*}For first-semester first-year students only, the GPA to remain in good standing is 1.8.

Major: Completion of a major is a requirement for the degree. Students are required to declare a major in the second semester of their sophomore year.

Minor: Students may select a program minor or interdisciplinary minor in addition to the major.

Office Hours: Supplemental one-on-one time with your professors to assist you in your course. These are either attended by appointment or during walk-in times. Office hours can be found on each course syllabus.

Pass/No Pass: Students may choose to take up to two courses per academic year on a pass/no-pass basis.

Syllabus: An outline of the subjects, assignments, and materials used for a specific class.

Withdrawal from Courses: A student may withdraw from a class after the 10th day of class and receive a grade of W. The last day to withdraw from a semester course with a W is the end of the 10th week.





GOUCHER COMMONS CURRICULUM

Goucher Commons Requirements (GCRs): Goucher expects all students to pursue a common set of learning experiences. These experiences are not based on a core curriculum or checklist of requirements, and students have great freedom to determine and then follow their own interests. In this pursuit, students enter a space of inquiry—the Goucher Commons—with other students and faculty.

1. FIRST-YEAR SEMINAR (FYS)

This course introduces students to the pleasures and demands of a liberal arts education. FYS offers a selection of small, discussion-based courses taught by faculty from across the disciplines.

2. COMPLEX PROBLEM EXPLORATION (CPE)

These courses are interdisciplinary, center around a contemporary issue, and require students to work in sustained collaborations in a student-directed research or creative project. Between their second semester at Goucher and the end of their junior year, students will take two Complex Problem Exploration (CPE) courses in two different areas. Students are limited to one CPE course per semester.

3. PROFICIENCY AREAS

- College Writing Proficiency (CWP) is a graduation requirement. Students must earn CWP at the general college level through a series of courses taught and overseen by the Writing Program. Their writing is then assessed by the Writing Program faculty. Students must apply for CWP by submitting a portfolio during the designated portfolio review periods.
- Data Analytics is a two-course sequence, with different courses for students in different majors. The first course is taken during year one or two, the next one as an explorations course, an elective, or a class in the major. Students must complete both part I and part II.
- Foreign Language and Culture is the study of a foreign language and its culture. It provides a foundational undergraduate competency. Foreign language study strengthens the development of cross-cultural awareness and intercultural communication. It provides opportunities for students to explore links between foreign language and other disciplines and prepares students for study abroad.

4. COMMON INQUIRY AREAS

- Race, Power, Perspective (RPP) integrates values of diversity, social justice, and global citizenship by asking students to not only recognize differences but also explore the power structures behind those differences.
- Environmental Sustainability requires students to demonstrate knowledge of scientific, policy, social, cultural, and/or historical dimensions of the human relationship to the environment. Specifically, students must be able to (1) evaluate environmental sustainability issues, (2) determine how personal and collective decisions and actions affect the environment, and (3) formulate or evaluate potential solutions to environmental sustainability problems.
- Study Abroad helps students demonstrate practical understanding of global citizenship and gain
 intercultural awareness through a study-abroad experience and completion of the one-credit Study
 Abroad Immersion Course. By studying abroad, students will explore different ways of thinking,
 communicating, working, learning, and living.

5. CAPSTONE EXPERIENCE/SIGNATURE PROJECT

This takes place during a student's final year, when they connect their learning to the bigger picture of life through a capstone experience or project within their major(s). Students are encouraged to curate this work through use of a reflection portfolio and to share this at the student symposium held at the close of each semester.

ACADEMIC AND STUDENT SERVICES

ACADEMIC CENTER FOR EXCELLENCE (ACE)

ACE is an academic and advising support center that embraces the strengths of a liberal arts education's holistic nature. ACE assists students in maximizing their potential to flourish and succeed at Goucher and beyond. It guides students in preparing for a life of inquiry, creativity, social responsibility, and personal and professional ethics and integrity. ACE includes Academic Success Coaching, the Office of Accessibility Services, and Success Advising.

CAREER EDUCATION OFFICE (CEO)

CEO makes career education a central element of each student's experience, through the curriculum, mentoring, and professional experience. The CEO staff are available to support students as they consider work-study positions on campus, part-time jobs, internships, or post-Goucher plans. Appointments can be made on Handshake, Goucher's jobsearching and application website, to meet with CEO staff. The CEO offers assistance in exploring majors, writing resumes and cover letters, or any other career topics. They also have a closet of business professional clothing that can be used for interviews.

CENTER FOR RACE, EQUITY, AND IDENTITY (CREI)

CREI is a space that strives to improve the community of all marginalized students, specifically students of color, first-generation students, LGBTQIA+ students, socioeconomically disadvantaged students, and disabled students/students with disabilities. CREI hosts community-building and affinity group programming, as well as student and student-group advising, advocacy, and mentorship.

COUNSELING CENTER

The Student Counseling Center provides free, confidential, and short-term counseling to full-time undergraduates for mental well-being as well as campus emotional wellness campaigns. Appointments can be made to meet with a counselor by going to the Student Counseling Center's website and completing a case management form. Students can seek short-term counseling with on-site campus counselors or get connected with off-campus services for long-term counseling needs.

CHAPLAIN & RELIGIOUS & SPIRITUAL LIFE

The Office of Religious and Spiritual Life at Goucher provides opportunities for students to expand their awareness of what others believe and how they practice; deepen their own practice, beliefs, questions, and commitments; connect with others to explore questions of meaning and purpose; and engage in dialogue within and among different religious, spiritual, and world views.

HEALTH CENTER

The Goucher Student Health Center is an outpatient primary health care facility that provides comprehensive medical care for acute and stable chronic illnesses, preventative medical care, and health education services. The Student Health Center is not an urgent care center.

LIBRARY

The library is a hub for many services at Goucher. Along with borrowing resources, the library is a great place to study with peers. The library is also home to academic supports such as the QR Center and the Writing Center.







OFFICE OF ACCESSIBILITY SERVICES (OAS)

OAS works with faculty, staff, and students to provide appropriate accommodations so that students have an equal opportunity to participate inside the classroom and in college programs and activities.

OFFICE OF COMMUNITY-BASED LEARNING (CBL)

CBL connects students' academic work with direct experience in the community. These experiences have the power to shift and inform academic pathways and future career choices as well as transform perspectives and personal identity.

OFFICE OF GLOBAL EDUCATION

The Office of Global Education is your home for information about our study abroad programs and international student support. At Goucher we believe an international perspective is needed to tackle the global challenges of today, and that's why 100% of our students study abroad.

OFFICE OF RESIDENTIAL LIFE

The Office of Residential Life oversees all aspects of life in the residence halls. Our goal is to educate residents through experiential learning, and we encourage community members to be productive and successful by providing appropriate challenges, guidance, and support. We celebrate differences, balance, and personal dignity.

OFFICE OF STUDENT ENGAGEMENT (OSE)

OSE is dedicated to providing quality on- and off-campus activities, leadership development opportunities, programs for new students, and late-night and weekend events that enhance the Goucher experience for students and their families.

QUANTITATIVE REASONING CENTER (QR CENTER)

The QR Center supports students in mathematics, science, social science, and other courses with a QR or data analytics (DA) emphasis. The QR Center provides programming for student development of quantitative literacy and applications of mathematics and math-based skills to real-life situations.


WELLNESS CENTER

The Wellness Center provides a calming environment open daily from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. The Wellness Center stocks tea, journaling materials, contraceptives, and more for use free of charge at the leisure of students to promote their overall wellbeing. FERPA

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (commonly referred to as "FERPA") affords students certain rights with respect to their education records. It is the policy of Goucher College (in accordance with FERPA) to withhold disclosure of personally identifiable information from educational records unless the student has consented to disclosure or FERPA allows disclosure.

A student includes any person who is or has been in attendance at the college and with respect to whom the college maintains an education record whether or not that person is currently in attendance.

The college considers all students who have attained the age of 18 to be independent of their parents and will not release records to parents/guardians absent the written consent of the student.

Students have the option to sign a FERPA Release form, which gives consent to the college to disclose their educational records to parent(s), legal guardian(s), or other designated person(s). The purpose of the consent is to allow Goucher College to release educational record(s) or information contained in their educational records.

Educational record information includes course schedules, reports of concern, grades, disciplinary records, and student account information (e.g., student financial aid, scholarships, etc.). This consent remains on a student's record and allows Goucher College to release information to parent(s) (or other designee) even when a student is no longer listed as a dependent

on a parent or guardian's income tax return, or if the student graduated and/or left the university.

The student must revoke this permission by notifying the Office of the Registrar in writing, indicating one's intention to do so.

Please note that records of persons who applied to and were admitted to Goucher College, but who did not begin attending classes, are not subject to FERPA.

Students have four basic rights under FERPA:

- The right to inspect and review their own education records within 45 days of the day the college receives a request for access. Note: Although the college is not required to maintain student records indefinitely, if a request to access a record has been made, the record will not be destroyed before the custodian has granted the student access.
- 2. The right to request the amendment of education records the student believes are inaccurate or misleading.
- 3. The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records.
- 4. The right to file a complaint concerning alleged failures of the college to comply with the requirements of FERPA.




