As a mother watches over her children, Willing to risk her own life to protect them, So with a boundless heart, should one cherish all living beings, Suffusing the whole world with unobstructed loving-kindness:

May all beings be peaceful and happy May all beings be safe from harm May all beings be healthy and strong May all beings have ease of well-being (Buddhist prayer)

There are three virtues of Confucianism: Wisdom, Kindness, and Bravery. The wise are free from perplexities, the kindhearted are free from worries, and the brave are free from fear.

(Confucian; Proverb; read in Mandarin)

We pray [for] strength, determination, and willpower, to do instead of merely to pray, to become instead of merely to wish; that our world may be safe, and that our lives may be blessed.

As Goucher moved classes online for the rest of the semester in response to a global pandemic and thousands of arts organizations canceled performances throughout the world, the Goucher Choirs were forced to cancel a major collaboration with the Deer Creek Chorale. What soon developed, however, was an opportunity to experiment with a virtual choir between the two ensembles in order to preserve our collaboration and as an outlet to sing during this time. Over 50 singers between the two ensembles contributed to the project—a performance of Dolly Parton's "Light of a Clear Blue Morning," which the Goucher College Commencement Choir was planning to perform in-person at Baccalaureate this year. Instead, we offer this virtual expression of resilience to the Class of 2020. Parton wrote this song as she was emerging from a time of great personal struggle early in her life. It has become an anthem that beckons to any who find themselves searching for a light or at the dawn of a brand new day.

Kathleen Hake

Kathleen Hake finished her first semester of college with only a .9 GPA. She completed her degree with a 3.9. It took eight years. During that time, she waited on tables, bartended, dishwashed, and cooked. She learned a lot about hard work, learning how to learn, shame, hope, resilience, disappointment, fear, courage, focus, and joy. She thanks her parents, to this day, for sticking by her.

One thing remains the same—she loves learning, in all of its non-linear, often messy, many times thrilling, ways.

Hake continued her education and earned an M.Ed. in educational policy/global studies in education from the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign. She completed a graduate certificate in women, leadership, and change from Johns Hopkins University. As a lifelong learner, she continues to engage in learning opportunities. Her current interests are brain-based learning and strategies, as well as how the embodied practices of mindfulness, self-compassion, and breathwork can enhance and improve resilience, well-being, and academic learning and success.

She has worked in higher education for 25 years in many capacities: community-based learning, student activities, leadership development, teaching, critical thinking and college reading, and academic coaching.

As an academic coach at Goucher, Hake loves creating an academic space where students can tap into their own wisdom, remember and name their strengths, develop learning skills, and harness their natural sources of energy for motivation, attention, and focus for the things that matter to them.

She lives 1.5 miles north of Goucher with her husband, Bryan, her son, Brady, and her two dogs, Annie and Ben. In her free time, she enjoys hiking the trails at Loch Raven, observing nature, reading, swimming, and vacuuming. (Seriously, she loves to vacuum.)

SPEAKERS

Cory Booker

Cory Booker believes that the American dream isn't real for anyone unless it's within reach of everyone. Booker has dedicated his life to fighting for those who have been left out, left behind, or left without a voice.

Booker grew up in northern New Jersey and received his undergraduate degree from Stanford University. At Stanford, Booker played varsity football, volunteered for the campus peer counseling center, and wrote for the student newspaper. He was awarded a Rhodes Scholarship and went on to study at the University of Oxford, and then Yale Law School, where he graduated in 1997.

Instead of working for a corporate law firm, Booker moved to Newark after law school and started a nonprofit organization to provide legal services for low-income families, helping tenants take on slumlords. In 1998, Booker moved into the Brick Towers housing project in Newark, where he lived until its demolition in 2006. Booker still lives in Newark's Central Ward today, where the median household income is less than \$15,000.

At 29, Booker was elected to the Newark City Council, where he challenged the city's entrenched political machine and fought to improve living conditions for city residents, increase public safety, and reduce crime.

Starting in 2006, Booker served as Newark's mayor for more than seven years. During his tenure, the city entered its largest period of economic growth since the 1960s. In addition, overall crime declined and the quality of life for residents improved due to initiatives such as more affordable housing, new green spaces and parks, increased educational opportunities, and more efficient city services.

In October 2013, Booker won a special election to represent New Jersey in the United States Senate. In November 2014, Senator Booker was re-elected to a full six-year term.

As New Jersey's junior Senator, Cory Booker has brought an innovative and consensus-building approach to tackling some of the most difficult problems facing New Jersey and our country. He has emerged as a national leader in the effort to fix our broken criminal justice system and end mass incarceration, helping craft the most sweeping set of criminal justice reforms in a generation, the First Step Act, which became law in December 2018.

Booker sits on the Judiciary Committee, the Foreign Relations Committee, and the Environment and Public Works Committee.

Named one of the top 10 most innovative colleges in the country by *U.S. News & World Report*, Goucher College prepares students for the jobs of the future.
