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Goucher College Poll: Sanders, Biden, Bloomberg leading Maryland Democratic Primary; all Democratic candidates beat President Donald Trump in head-to-head matchups;

Trump remains unpopular

BALTIMORE (February 25, 2020)—The Goucher College Poll asked Maryland Democratic likely voters about their presidential primary, how they viewed each Democratic presidential candidate, and their preferences toward candidate ideology and electability versus closeness of position on issues. The poll also asked all Maryland likely voters their preferences in general election matchups between President Donald Trump and each of the Democratic candidates. From **February 13-19**, 2020, the Goucher College Poll surveyed 929 Maryland adults to identify 718 Maryland likely voters, with a margin of error of +/-3.6 percent, and 371 (+/-5.1) likely Democratic voters.

Twenty-four percent of Maryland Democratic likely voters say they will vote for Bernie Sanders, **18 percent** for Joe Biden, and **16 percent** for Michael Bloomberg. **Seven percent** would vote for Pete Buttigieg, **6 percent** for Amy Klobuchar, and **6 percent** for Elizabeth Warren. All other candidates earn support from **fewer than 1 percent** of voters. **Eighteen percent** have no preference or are undecided.

"There's been significant change in the preferences of Maryland Democratic likely voters since the September 2019 Goucher College Poll. Reflecting national polls, Sanders has gained ground while both Biden and Warren have lost support in Maryland. After a late entry to the race, Michael Bloomberg has built some support among Maryland Democrats," said Mileah Kromer, director of the Sarah T. Hughes Field Politics Center at Goucher College. "We'll have a better picture after Super Tuesday, but it's certainly possible that the Maryland primary will be hotly contested rather than inconsequential to the outcome of the primary."

Democratic Candidate Favorability Ratings

Maryland Democratic likely voters were asked whether they held a favorable or unfavorable opinion of each of the Democratic candidates:

- 74 percent held a favorable view toward Bernie Sanders; 23 percent held an unfavorable view.
- 67 percent held a favorable view toward Elizabeth Warren; 22 percent held an unfavorable view.
- 64 percent held a favorable view toward Joe Biden; 32 percent held an unfavorable view.
- 61 percent held a favorable view toward Pete Buttigieg; 25 percent held an unfavorable view.
- 54 percent held a favorable view toward Michael Bloomberg; 34 percent held an unfavorable view.
- 53 percent held a favorable view toward Amy Klobuchar; 21 percent held an unfavorable view.
- 31 percent held a favorable view toward Tom Steyer; 36 percent held an unfavorable view.
- 22 percent held a favorable view toward Tulsi Gabbard; 48 percent held an unfavorable view.

Policy Closeness vs. Electability

Forty-seven percent of Democratic likely voters say it's more important to find a candidate who is likely to defeat Trump, and **39 percent** say finding a candidate whose positions on the issues comes closest to theirs is more important.

General Election Matchups

All Maryland likely voters were asked who they would vote for if the election were between Trump and each one of the Democratic candidates:

- 61 percent Bernie Sanders/34 percent Donald Trump
- **60 percent** Joe Biden/**35 percent** Donald Trump
- 59 percent Michael Bloomberg/32 percent Donald Trump
- **59 percent** Amy Klobuchar/**32 percent** Donald Trump
- **59 percent** Elizabeth Warren/**35 percent** Donald Trump
- **58 percent** Pete Buttigieg/**33 percent** Donald Trump
- **54 percent** Tom Steyer/**36 percent** Donald Trump
- 52 percent Tulsi Gabbard/35 percent Donald Trump

Trump and Congress

Thirty-one percent of Marylanders approve of the job Trump is doing as President of the United States and **62 percent** disapprove. **Thirteen percent** of residents approve of the job Congress is doing and **79 percent** disapprove.

Survey Methodology

To ensure all Maryland residents are represented, the poll is conducted using random digit dialing (RDD) of a county-level stratified random sample using landline and cellular telephone numbers. The sample of telephone numbers for the survey is purchased from Dynata (https://www.dynata.com/).

The survey was conducted **Thursday**, **February 13**, **to Wednesday**, **February 19**. During this time, interviews were conducted 3 to 9 p.m. on Monday to Friday and 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday. The Goucher College Poll uses Voxco Computer-Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI) software to administer its surveys. A staff of professionally trained, paid student interviewers conducts the interviews.

Interviewers attempted to reach respondents with working phone numbers a maximum of five times. Only Maryland adults—residents aged 18 years or older—were eligible to participate. Interviews were not conducted with adults who were reached at business or work numbers. **Eighty-five percent** of the interviews were conducted on a cell phone and **15 percent** were conducted on a landline.

Interviews for this survey were completed with **929** Maryland adults. For a sample size of **929**, there is a **95 percent** probability the survey results have a plus or minus **3.2 percentage point** sampling error from the actual population distribution for any given survey question. Margins of error are higher for subsamples.

In addition to sampling error, all surveys are subject to sources of non-sampling error, including question wording effects, question order effects, and non-response bias. Margin of error is not adjusted for design effects. Data are weighted by gender, age, race, region, and educational attainment of the state to represent adult population targets established by the most recent American Community Survey (ACS).

Survey Question Design

The Goucher College Poll provides the questions as worded and the order in which they are administered to respondents.

BRACKETED ITEMS []: Items and statements in brackets are rotated to ensure respondents do not receive a set order of response options, which maintains question construction integrity by avoiding respondent agreement based on question composition.

Example: [agree or disagree] or [disagree or agree]

PROBE (p): Some questions contain a "probe" maneuver to determine a respondent's intensity of opinion/perspective. Probe techniques used in this questionnaire mainly consist of asking respondents if their responses are more intense than initially provided.

<u>Example</u>: Do you have a [favorable or unfavorable] opinion of Governor Larry Hogan? <u>PROBE</u>: Would you say very favorable/unfavorable?

OPEN-ENDED: No response options are provided for an open-ended question, i.e., it is entirely up to the respondent to provide the response information. Any response options provided to the interviewer are not read to the respondent; they are only used to help reduce interviewer error and time in coding the response.

VOLUNTEER (v): Volunteer responses means the interviewer did not offer that response option in the question as read to the interviewer. Interviewers are instructed not to offer "don't know" or "refused" or "some other opinion" to the respondent, but the respondent is free to volunteer that information for the interviewer to record.
