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Goucher College Poll results:

Maryland residents feel impact of price increases, a majority hold a positive view of the state economy; Residents divided over how state should spend the budget surplus, view crime and public safety as the top priority; Hogan remains popular, opinions divided on Biden; Residents support the legalization of recreational cannabis

BALTIMORE (March 14, 2022)—The Goucher College Poll asked Maryland residents their views on state priorities, direction, and spending; the current economic situation; and the legalization of recreational marijuana. Residents were also asked to rate Gov. Larry Hogan and President Joe Biden. The Goucher College Poll surveyed 635 Maryland adults from March 1 to 6, 2022, and has a margin of error of +/-3.9 percent. Results by voter registration and other key demographics are provided.

Economic Perceptions

More than half (**56 percent**) of Marylanders say that recent price increases have caused either a minor (**26 percent**) or major (**30 percent**) financial hardship. **Forty-three percent** indicate that they have not been impacted. About half (**52 percent**) of residents hold a mostly positive view of the current economic situation in Maryland; **41 percent** hold a mostly negative view.

When asked to compare their current financial situation now to a year ago, **47 percent** say it's "about the same," **33 percent** say it's "worse," and **19 percent** say it's "better."

"Marylanders are definitely feeling an economic pinch. A third say they are worse off financially than they were a year ago, and more than half say they are affected by the recent price increases," said Mileah Kromer, director of the Sarah T. Hughes Center for Politics at Goucher College. "Price increases have yet to dampen views of the state's broader economic situation—a majority continue to say it's mostly positive, the same as in October though down somewhat from this time last year."

State Priorities, Direction, and Spending

Residents identify crime and public safety (**25 percent**), education (**17 percent**), economic issues and jobs (**14 percent**), and health care (**11 percent**) as the issues they want the state government to prioritize. **Fifty-five percent** say Maryland is heading in the right direction, and **32 percent** say Maryland is on the wrong track.

Residents were equally divided in their opinions toward how the state government should spend the current budgetary surplus: **50 percent** prefer to increase funding for public services and **49 percent** prefer tax cuts.

Legalization of Recreational Marijuana

Sixty-two percent of Maryland residents support the legalization of recreational marijuana, and **34 percent** oppose it.

Among Democrats: **65 percent** support, **32 percent** oppose
Among independents: **65 percent** support, **32 percent** oppose
Among Republicans: **54 percent** support, **44 percent** oppose

Gov. Larry Hogan and President Joe Biden

Gov. Hogan continues to earn widespread support among state residents. **Sixty-five percent** of Marylanders approve of the job Hogan is doing as governor, **25 percent** disapprove, and **8 percent** say they don't know.

Among Democrats: **61 percent** approve, **28 percent** disapprove
Among independents: **69 percent** approve, **22 percent** disapprove
Among Republicans: **71 percent** approve, **23 percent** disapprove

Marylanders are divided in their attitudes toward Joe Biden: **48 percent** approve of the job he's doing as president, and **47 percent** disapprove. Last year, **62 percent** of Maryland residents approved of the job Biden was doing and **31 disapproved**.

Among Democrats: **68 percent** approve, **26 percent** disapprove
Among independents: **34 percent** approve, **62 percent** disapprove
Among Republicans: **16 percent** approve, **82 percent** disapprove

Survey Methodology

To ensure all Maryland residents are represented, the poll is conducted using random digit dialing (RDD) of a county-level stratified random sample using landline and cellular telephone numbers. The sample of telephone numbers and interviewing were provided by Dynata (<https://www.dynata.com/>). The survey was conducted **March 1 to 6, 2022**. During this time, interviews were conducted from **1 to 9 p.m.**

Interviewers attempted to reach respondents with working phone numbers a maximum of five times. Only Maryland adults—residents aged 18 years or older—were eligible to participate. Interviews were not conducted with adults who were reached at business or work numbers. **Eighty-five percent** of the interviews were conducted on a cell phone and **15 percent** were conducted on a landline.

Interviews for this survey were completed with **635** Maryland adults. For a sample size of **635**, there is a **95 percent** probability the survey results have a **+/-3.9 percentage** point sampling error from the actual population distribution for any given survey question. For the sample of **593 Maryland adults** identified as registered voters, there is a **95 percent** probability the survey results have a **+/-4.0 percentage** point sampling error from the actual population distribution for any given survey question. Margins of error are higher for subsamples. In addition to sampling error, all surveys are subject to sources of non-sampling error, including question wording effects, question order effects, and non-response bias. Margin of error is not adjusted for design effects. Data is weighted by gender, age, race, region, and educational attainment of the state to represent adult population targets established by the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) and U.S. Census.

Survey Question Design

The Goucher College Poll provides the questions as worded and the order in which they are administered to respondents.

BRACKETED ITEMS []: Items and statements in brackets are rotated to ensure respondents do not receive a set order of response options, which maintains question construction integrity by avoiding respondent agreement based on question composition.

Example: [agree or disagree] or [disagree or agree]

PROBE (p): Some questions contain a “probe” maneuver to determine a respondent’s intensity of opinion/perspective. Probe techniques used in this questionnaire mainly consist of asking respondents if their responses are more intense than initially provided.

Example: Do you have a [favorable or unfavorable] opinion of President Joe Biden?

PROBE: Would you say very favorable/unfavorable?

OPEN-ENDED: No response options are provided for an open-ended question, i.e., it is entirely up to the respondent to provide the response information. Any response options provided to the interviewer are not read to the respondent; they are only used to help reduce interviewer error and time in coding the response.

VOLUNTEER (v): Volunteer responses means the interviewer did not offer that response option in the question as read to the interviewer. Interviewers are instructed not to offer “don’t know” or “refused” or “some other opinion” to the respondent, but the respondent is free to volunteer that information for the interviewer to record.

Of the **635** Maryland adult residents surveyed, **593** indicated they were registered voters with the Democratic, Republican, or other party or registered unaffiliated (i.e., independent).
