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SYLLABUS / FRAMEWORK FOR THE WEEK AP 548.300 Preparing Students for AP Economics—July 8-12, 2019

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed as an institute for current high school teachers of AP Economics, regardless of experience level: new to AP or an experienced teacher. The course will include an overview of content, course organization, selection and use of materials, test development, and a strong emphasis on methodology and teaching strategies. It will not be a week focused solely on content; time is not available to target one area versus another. Participants will focus on ways to connect content to assessments and active learning. Participants will develop lessons and materials with content specific to the AP Microeconomics and AP Macroeconomics courses. Participants are encouraged to bring class outlines, textbooks, course syllabi, and sample lessons to share and modify. Participants will be expected to collaborate and help each other learn, listen, share and succeed. In addition, participants will discuss the agenda and expectations of the College Board-topics from equity to expectations for the teacher and students.

COURSE INFORMATION

- 1. This class will meet **daily** from 8:30-4 Monday through Thursday and on Friday, we will meet from 8:30-1.
- 2. There is **NO** specific required textbook for this class. Rather, numerous texts and sources will be given to students to use and share for this class. You are **strongly encouraged** to bring copies of your text you use in your class as well as materials, lessons and samples to share with others in the class. This will be **a working class** and **you are expected to work with other teachers and share and create materials** to use in your AP class upon your return to school later in the year. Regardless of your experience, **we all learn** from each other!

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SESSION DESCRIPTION

This 4 1/2 -day workshop is for both new and experienced AP teachers in either AP macroeconomics or AP microeconomics to become more familiar with the content, assessments and methodologies associated with these classes and programs offered by College Board. Participants will work individually as well as in pairs and teams to do activities and assessments in both courses. Additionally, attendees will use actual AP exams to grade and learn the reading process in scoring these tests. Time will be allotted for discussion and preparing for the AP course audit.

EXPECTATIONS/LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. Participants will gain a deeper understanding of the scope and sequence of both courses.
- 2. Participants will learn how to vary instruction to include a variety of best practices in exploring

content, methodology and assessments in both courses.

3. Participants will become more aware of a wider variety of materials, in both print and non-print

formats, to use in planning, delivering and assessing lessons for their students.

During the workshop, the following procedures will be used to engage and measure student/ teacher learning outcomes—Participants will:

- 1. Be engaged in group, paired or individual activities to learn and explore material.
- 2. Use both multiple choice and free response exam items to see how these work and can be

effective teaching moments in class.

3. Use both print and non- print materials to be engaged with and exposed to content.

4. Reflect on ways this workshop will modify and change their design and teaching of future

classes in this course.
